Savannah Salutes:

A SURVIVORS TRIBUTE AND CELEBRATION OF LIFE

Savannah Salutes: A Survivors Tribute and Celebration of Life was a meaningful, community-driven event honoring the families of 23 fallen Soldiers. Designed to uplift, connect, and recognize our Gold Star/surviving Families, the day brought together military and community partners to create a memorable and supportive experience.

The event began at Second Harvest of Coastal Georgia, where families were welcomed and boarded private trolleys generously provided by Old Town Trolley Tours. While following the traditional historic tour of the City of Savannah, the experience was uniquely tailored with special, personal stops designed specifically for our survivors. The first stop brought families to American Legion Post 135, where they toured the historic facility and connected with veteran organizations offering continued support to survivors. During this stop, The Landings Military Relief Fund provided a catered lunch from Betty Bombers, and the American Legion presented each family with a poppy challenge coin in remembrance of their fallen Soldiers. Mayor Van Johnson joined the group to personally express his gratitude, sharing words of appreciation and love on behalf of the city for the sacrifices made by these families.



Another highlight included a visit to SCADstory, where families explored the impact and innovation of the Savannah College of Art and Design, further emphasizing the strong relationship between the installation and the local community.

The final stop welcomed families to Leopold's Ice Cream, where owner Mr. Stratton Leopold shared the rich history of his iconic establishment and treated families to complimentary ice cream, creating a joyful and heartfelt moment.

Following the tour, families returned to Second Harvest of Coastal Georgia to prepare for an evening social and dinner. The entire evening our 3ID band serenaded our families. The social hour featured refreshments provided by Two Chicks and a Cup of Joe, creating a warm and inviting space for connection. Dinner was provided by the Fort Stewart Club, followed by a meaningful program featuring guest speaker LTC Derick Taylor. BG Kevin Bradley presented handmade mementoes to families, offering a lasting tribute to their loved ones. The day concluded with families coming together in remembrance, connection, and support—sharing stories, honoring their Soldiers, and experiencing the strength of a community that stands beside them.

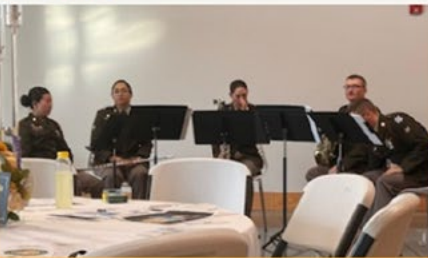

Gold Star Gamers provides year-round programming for Gold Star children, including virtual mentorship, STEM education, online social events, gaming tournaments, summer camps, and in-person activations across the country. Our goal is to create safe, engaging spaces where children can build community, develop skills, and connect with positive mentors and peers who understand their experiences.

MENTORSHIP

A program pairs each Gold Star Gamer with a mentor who provides one-on-one guidance, encouragement, and connection. We also grant special requests—like gaming equipment—to help every child fully participate and grow.

TRAINING CAMPS

Each summer, weeklong, bootcamp-style training camps where up to 12 kids join virtual half-day sessions led by a dedicated coach.

TOURNAMENTS & EVENTS

For competitions, each child is paired with an adult military gamer from the same branch. Together, they train and compete as a two-person team, meeting for practice sessions and game day—virtually or in person.

Financial stability and security are an important part of supporting surviving Family members today and in the future. There are several resources for Families to help them adjust to financial changes and to plan wisely.

- ★ **Beneficiary Financial Counseling Service (BFCS)**
This service provides Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance beneficiaries with free advice from Financial Point, an independent company with a team of experts who handle many types of financial matters. Beneficiaries can access this service online 24/7 to request a financial plan. *Note: The service is available for two years from the date the claim is paid; it includes 40 hours of personal counseling and access to the program's online resources. <https://www.benefits.va.gov/insurance/bfcs.asp>
- ★ **Financial Readiness Program**
This program provides general information about military benefits, spending plans, retirement, TSP, debt repayment, tax planning, identity theft, managing consumer credit, and consumer safety and rights. The Army's personal financial counselors and managers (PFCs and PFM) offer education. *Note: PFCs and PFM cannot provide investment advice. To find a PFC or PFM, visit the Financial Readiness website: <https://www.financialfrontline.org/>.
- ★ **HEART Act of 2008**
The Heroes Earnings Assistance and Relief Tax Act of 2008 (HEART Act Public Law 110-245, §109) allows recipients of a death gratuity and/or SGLI to contribute all or part of the payments to a Roth IRA and/or a Coverdell Education Savings Account (CESA)

without restrictions on contributions or distributions. Contributions must be made within one year of receiving the benefits. If you are the recipient of a death gratuity and/or the SGLI, you can protect and grow these assets for long-term financial security. For more information, read the **HEART Act for Beneficiaries**.

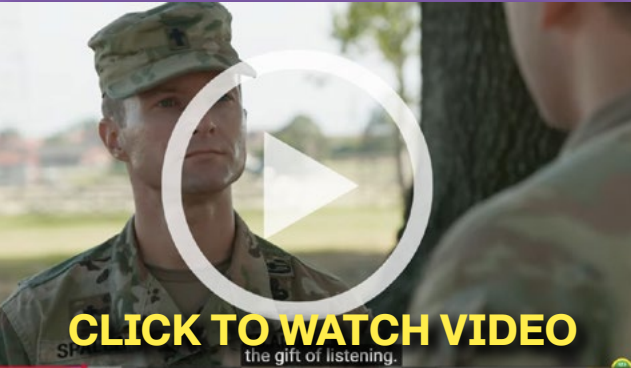
- ★ **MilTax**
Military life can make for tricky taxes. To help, the Defense Department offers MilTax software through Military OneSource. It takes into account deployments, combat and training pay, housing and rentals, multistate filings, living OCONUS and more.  - ★ **myPay**
Survivors who receive annuity pay from the Defense Department can access myPay, the **online pay management system** for the DOD's Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS). MyPay provides convenient access to information about your payments and lets you easily update your account information and submit your annual certification. Those who provide an email address in myPay can receive important messages from the DFAS about their account and information from their loved one's branch of service.
 - ★ **New to myPay?**
There is a large menu of Frequently Asked Questions with answers on **how to use myPay**. You can browse more Frequently Asked Questions with answers or submit a question using **AskDFAS**. There are also **helpful videos on using myPay**.
 - ★ **Survivor Benefit Plan**
The Survivor Benefit Plan is a program the Defense Department sponsors and subsidizes that provides up to 55 percent of a service member's retired pay to an eligible beneficiary after the member dies. The program provides no-cost automatic coverage to active-duty members and to reserve members who die of a service-connected cause while performing inactive-duty training. In addition, those on active duty can purchase coverage upon retirement, and reserve members can receive coverage when they have 20 years of qualifying service for reserve retirement pay.

We provide support and training locally, nationally, and internationally to individuals and organizations seeking to assist children in grief.

BEREAVEMENT CAMPS: A PLACE TO GRIEVE AND HEAL

The following camps and programs work to provide grieving children with a comfortable place to talk about their emotions and feel understood:

- COMFORT ZONE CAMP** - Free bereavement camps (in-person and virtual) for kids ages 7–17 who’ve lost a parent, sibling or caregiver.
- THE DOUGY CENTER** - Peer support groups, education and training for grieving children, teens, young adults and families.
- ELUNA – CAMP ERIN** - Free weekend camps for children in military families, blending traditional camp fun with grief support.
- TAPS GOOD GRIEF CAMPS & FAMILY CAMPS** - Camps nationwide pairing young survivors with military and veteran mentors who understand loss.
- SNOWBALL EXPRESS** - All-expenses-paid December experience creating joy and connection for children of fallen post-9/11 service members.
- PROJECT COMMON BOND (TUESDAY’S CHILDREN)** - Camps and retreats for teens and young adults impacted by terrorism, focused on healing and leadership.
- SOFWOLF** - Summer outdoor leadership, college and career program for teens of fallen Special Operations Forces service members.

PROGRAMS FOR ADULTS

What beneficiaries need to know

Death Gratuity / Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance (SGLI)

The time following the loss of your Soldier is extremely difficult. In addition to dealing with grief, you may be faced with financial insecurity and the need to make decisions about the survivor benefits you will receive. Your Soldier designated beneficiaries for the death gratuity and SGLI to provide financial stability. Recipients of these benefits can protect their finances by using provisions of the HEART Act.

AMERICAN HEROES TRIBUTE

Banner Campaign honoring United States Military Personnel who have given their lives in the War On Terror in Afghanistan and Iraq, and the families they leave behind, through our banner campaign.

When the family of a Fallen Hero contacts us, we request they send us a photo and the remembrance information they would like to appear on the banner. In this way, the family designs the banner for their loved one.

We then engage our Veteran-Owned Small Business printer-partner that produces the 3' X 9' banner that we keep in our inventory to display at the 15-20 events that we support each year. The display of the banners at these events is how we keep the Fallen Heroes in the public eye to honor, celebrate and preserve their memory.

We also produce an 18" X 54" Commemorative size banner that we present to the family that they can display when and where they wish.

SURVIVOR ACCESS CARD

Eligible surviving spouses can have unescorted access to military installations so they can receive benefits they are entitled to by law or policy. Next of kin to a covered member of the Army may also access military installations in accordance with the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) of Fiscal Year (FY) 2018. See Section 626.

If eligible next of kin do not have a military ID card, they will need the Army Survivor Access Card. With this card, next of kin can access services and attend events and memorials. To get or renew a Survivor Access Card, complete the APPLICATION FOR SURVIVOR ACCESS CARD (IMCOM Form 44) and submit the form to a survivor outreach services coordinator. This is the first step to getting a card.

SURVIVOR ASSISTANCE

Grants are available to surviving Families through transition periods or initial periods of adjustment while awaiting government entitlements such as Survivor Benefits, Social Security, VA or Dependency and Indemnity Compensation to commence.

SURVIVOR MONTHLY SUBSISTENCE

When survivors have an ongoing situation of inadequate income to meet basic needs, a monthly allowance may be provided. Assistance is only provided when all other personal, local, state and federal resources have been exhausted.

ELIGIBILITY

- ★ Spouse with valid dependent military ID card who has not remarried
- ★ Dependent child with valid military ID card
- ★ Survivor must have been dependent at the time of death of the Soldier/retired Soldier
- ★ Dual-military surviving spouse
- ★ Unmarried dependent child younger than 26 enrolled in an accredited institution of higher learning

You may be authorized one relocation move at government expense that must be completed within three years of your service member's death. The policy for your final relocation is contained in The Joint Travel Regulations (JTR), Section 051104.

Utah Fallen Warrior Recognition: Ceremony was held on 13 February 2026 at the State Capitol, successfully honored 15 Fallen Warriors with 100% family participation. This high-visibility event, supported by Governor Cox and Lt. Gov. Henderson, leveraged a “whole-of-government” approach by uniting the 88th RD Survivor Outreach Support Coordinator Lavern Butler and National Guard representatives along with Department of Veterans Affairs. A pivotal moment of the ceremony was the intentional reframing of the term “Survivor” by the SOS team; rather than a label of tragedy, it was presented as a badge of strength, resilience, and continued legacy. This shift in narrative directly bolstered survivor trust and reinforced the state’s enduring commitment to those who carry forward the memory of our fallen service members.

The execution phase reached its peak as families were formally escorted to both the House and Senate floors for dual-chamber legislative recognition. As names of the 15 Fallen Warriors—representing the Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marines—were read aloud, the full legislative body stood in a unified show of respect, marking a significant achievement in state-level ceremonial honors. Beyond the immediate emotional impact, the event achieved critical strategic effects: it elevated the visibility of Survivor Outreach Services at the highest levels of government and solidified the interagency partnership between federal and state stakeholders. This successful engagement serves as a benchmark for demonstrating how ceremonial dignity can be used to advance long-term institutional support and mission accomplishment.

ONLINE SURVIVOR BENEFITS REPORT

When a service member in active-duty status dies, the casualty assistance officer provides an initial Online Survivor Benefits Report to eligible surviving spouses, children and guardians of eligible family members. The OSBR summarizes current financial benefits and projects future benefits from all federal sources, including the Defense Department, the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Social Security Administration. In addition to reviewing the initial OSBR with the survivor, the CAO lets them know about the interactive OSBR, which survivors can access anytime using their DS Logon/myAuth.

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TRAVIS MANION FOUNDATION SURVIVOR EXPEDITIONS

TMF Service Expeditions are 4–7 day, service-based trips for surviving family members of fallen military heroes. These experiences bring families together to connect with others who understand their loss, honor their loved ones through meaningful service, and build community and personal growth.

Open to spouses, parents, siblings, and children who are at least two years removed from their loss, Expeditions take place in locations such as Alaska, Montana, Texas, Arizona, and Puerto Rico. Participants work on projects like disaster recovery, conservation, and community improvement in partnership with local nonprofits, creating a lasting impact while carrying forward their loved one's legacy of service.

ID Card Update for Remarried Surviving Spouses



New Policy

Effective Sept. 30, 2025, remarried surviving spouses of deceased service members—including active duty, National Guard and reserve—are eligible for commissary, exchange and MWR privileges under Section 633 of the fiscal year 2024 National Defense Authorization Act and Title 10, USC, Section 1062.

To get a Uniformed Services ID card:

- Update your DEERS record under the deceased sponsor.
- Complete DD Form 11722.
- Bring two valid IDs (one government-issued photo ID) and schedule an appointment via the RAPIDS Locator.

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Education Benefits for Survivors

December 2025

As a Surviving spouse or child, you can use benefits from multiple sources to continue your education. Benefits may cover the costs of tuition, fees, books, supplies and even living expenses.

Who provides education benefits for Survivors?

- The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)
- Veteran service organizations (VSOs) and other non-profit organizations.
- State governments, including public colleges and universities.
- Individual schools, colleges and universities.



VA educational benefits can be used for business, technical or vocational programs; certification tests; apprenticeships and on-the-job training; tutorial assistance and work-study programs, as well as programs in colleges and universities.

Some Survivors may qualify for **Veterans Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) or Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB)**, if the service member participated in those programs, or the **Post-9/11 GI Bill**, if the service member transferred benefits to a spouse and/or child before their death.

If you remarry, you'll keep your eligibility for the Fry Scholarship if you qualified for this education benefit through your previous marriage. If you had unused Fry Scholarship benefits that expired, you may be able to restore those benefits to use anytime after January 2, 2025, even if you've remarried. To get your benefits restored, you'll need to apply again using VA Form 22-5490. Surviving children must use benefits before age 26. Other restrictions may apply.

DEA or Fry Scholarship?

A Surviving child whose parent died before August 1, 2011, may use both the Fry Scholarship and DEA, one program at a time. Combined benefits can fund up to 81 months of education.

A child whose parent died after July 31, 2011, and Surviving spouses widowed on or after September 11, 2001, must make an irrevocable decision of which benefit (DEA or Fry) they wish to receive.

To receive VA educational benefits, you must attend a VA approved school. Listings are continuously updated. Verify your school's eligibility for funding at the web address included in the Links list on the next page.

DID YOU VERIFY YOUR ENROLLMENT THIS MONTH ?

Don't forget! As of January 2026, all Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) education beneficiaries, including Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance (Chapter 35) students, must verify their enrollment each month to receive benefit payments.

Survivors who receive annuity pay from the Defense Department can access myPay, the online **pay management system** for the DOD's Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS). MyPay provides convenient access to information about your payments and lets you easily update your account information and submit your annual certification. Those who provide an email address in myPay can receive important messages from the DFAS about their account and information from their loved one's branch of service. There is a large menu of Frequently Asked Questions with answers on **how to use myPay**. You can browse more Frequently Asked Questions with answers or submit a question using AskDFAS. There are also **helpful videos on using myPay**.

The Flags of Valor event is made possible through the efforts of America's Heartland Remembers, a non-profit organization, and the dedication of hundreds of volunteers who come together to set up and take down the massive display.

The event is open to the public, providing an opportunity for people of all ages to learn about the significance of 9/11 and honor the fallen.

EXPERIENCE THE TRIBUTE

For those who wish to understand the profound impact of this event, a 2022 Emmy Award-winning video captures the spirit of the 2021 tribute. The video showcases the powerful sight of volunteers placing the flags and the emotional experience of walking among them, with the gentle clinking of dog tags serving as a somber reminder of the lives lost. Each flag bore the photograph and dog tag of one of those brave men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice. Standing witness to the display, we hear the whisper flags and the clinking of dog tags asking to be read, to be remembered.

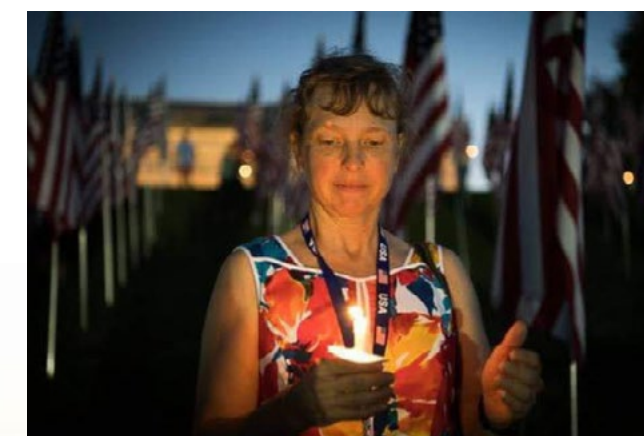

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SUPPORTING OUR MILITARY FAMILIES: EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE AND SURVIVOR OUTREACH SERVICES

The Employee Assistance Program (EAP), working alongside Survivor Outreach Services (SOS), provides comprehensive and confidential support tailored to the surviving family members of deceased military personnel. Understanding that the loss of a loved one brings profound emotional and practical challenges, these programs offer dedicated, long-term assistance to help navigate life's complexities. Eligible family members gain access to a wide range of vital resources, including grief and bereavement counseling, crisis intervention, short-term problem solving, and referrals to specialized behavioral health professionals. The core mission of these services is to ensure that families remain continually connected to the military community, honoring the service and sacrifice of their loved ones by delivering compassionate care during difficult life transitions.

Navigating these support networks is made easier through dedicated advocates and Employee Assistance Program Liaisons (EAPLs) who serve as direct points of contact for surviving families. These professionals assist with everything from emotional wellness referrals to navigating administrative requirements, such as coordinating essential documentation and benefit updates with the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS). To learn more about the available EAP and SOS resources, or to request confidential assistance, surviving family members within the United States Army Reserve Command (USARC) are highly encouraged to reach out via the dedicated group e-mail at usarmy.usarc.usarc-hq.mbx.employee-assistance-program@army.mil. Reaching out ensures that families seamlessly receive the individualized care, benefit guidance, and emotional support they rightfully deserve.

As a retiree, the sooner you alert the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) to any life change that might affect your pay, the timelier and more accurate your pay will be. Keeping your account updated includes making sure your mailing address, email address, banking information, allotments, tax withholding status, and beneficiary choices are current.

Be sure to report any change of life events as soon as they happen. These life-changing events might include:

- Moving
- Marriage or Remarriage
- Divorce
- Birth or adoption of a child
- Death of a spouse or child
- Direct Deposit account changes

Some changes, especially those regarding Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) coverage, have a one-year time limit, so it is very important that you notify DFAS of life-changing events when they happen. And when you notify us, be sure to include photocopies of supporting documents, such as birth or marriage certificates.

Now it's easier than ever to keep your SBP account up to date. If you are making a change to your SBP coverage because of a life event, you can use our new Form Wizard to assist you in completing the DD Form 2656-6, SBP Election Change Certificate, found at: <https://www.esd.whs.mil/Portals/54/Documents/DD/forms/dd/dd2656-6.pdf>.

We also have a Form Wizard to assist you with the DD Form 2894, found at: <https://www.esd.whs.mil/Portals/54/Documents/DD/forms/dd/dd2894.pdf> to update your Arrears of Pay (AOP) (last paycheck) beneficiary.

When using DD Form 2894 Form Wizard to complete your form, you can take advantage of a fully online experience with electronic signature, and a convenient one-click upload to AskDFAS.

In addition, if you have a question about your account, you can now submit your question via our new AskDFAS online "Ask a Question" tool instead of needing to call our Customer Care Center during business hours. You'll get a response via AskDFAS that you can check when it's convenient for you.

You can also update your mailing address using our convenient AskDFAS online tool.

Keeping your contact information updated is key to staying informed. DFAS occasionally sends out correspondence regarding changes in the law that affect your pay.

PURPOSE
 The Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) hosted the 32nd Annual National Military Survivor Seminar and Good Grief Camp during Memorial Day Weekend. The event brought together surviving military family members, military mentors, casualty assistance professionals, veterans service organizations, and subject matter experts from across the nation. The mission of TAPS is to provide compassionate care and comprehensive resources to all those grieving the loss of a military loved one. Their guiding message throughout the event was to **“Remember the Love, Celebrate the Life, and Share the Journey.”**

SURVIVOR OUTREACH SERVICES PARTICIPATION
 Survivor Outreach Services (SOS) participated as a Resource Village partner, providing information, referral services, outreach, and case coordination support to surviving family members. The Resource Village serves as a centralized location where survivors can access experts in military benefits, advocacy, education, survivor services, entitlements, veteran affairs, and military family support programs. As Resource Village subject matter experts, Ms. Priewe and Ms. Butler met individually with survivors to assess needs, answer questions, provide referrals, and connect family members with their assigned SOS Coordinators and other support agencies.

KEY OUTCOMES
 During the event, we received and spoke with over 100 survivor referrals. Many survivors were unaware of who their local SOS Coordinator was, while others had recently relocated and had not yet established contact with their new SOS office. Several survivors shared that they had been actively engaged with TAPS but were unfamiliar with Survivor Outreach Services and the long-term support available through SOS.

Additionally, several surviving family members attending the seminar had experienced the loss of their service members within the previous 30 days. These survivors were connected with appropriate support services and provided information regarding available resources and benefits.

OBSERVATIONS

The Resource Village provided an excellent opportunity for networking, collaboration, and relationship building among organizations serving military survivors. The event demonstrated the importance of maintaining strong partnerships to ensure survivors receive timely, accurate, and compassionate support.

One particularly meaningful interaction involved a survivor over the age of 60 who shared stories about continuing to ride his motorcycle and traveling to visit family members and fellow survivors. He expressed how maintaining those connections helps him remain engaged with the military community and honor the memory of his loved one. Conversations such as these highlighted the resilience of military survivors and the enduring value of community support.

Throughout the seminar, survivors shared stories of healing, remembrance, and personal growth. While grief remains a lifelong journey, many attendees spoke about finding hope, purpose, and connection through organizations such as TAPS and Survivor Outreach Services.

ASSESSMENT

The seminar successfully connected survivors with critical resources, benefits information, and support networks. Participation by Survivor Outreach Services increased awareness of SOS programs and strengthened coordination with survivors who had not previously established contact with their assigned coordinators.

The event reinforced the importance of proactive outreach, continued collaboration with community partners, and maintaining visibility within survivor-focused programs and events.

RECOMMENDATION

Continue participation in future TAPS National Military Survivor Seminars and Good Grief Camps to strengthen survivor engagement, improve awareness of SOS services, facilitate referrals, and expand partnerships with agencies supporting Gold Star Families and military survivors nationwide.

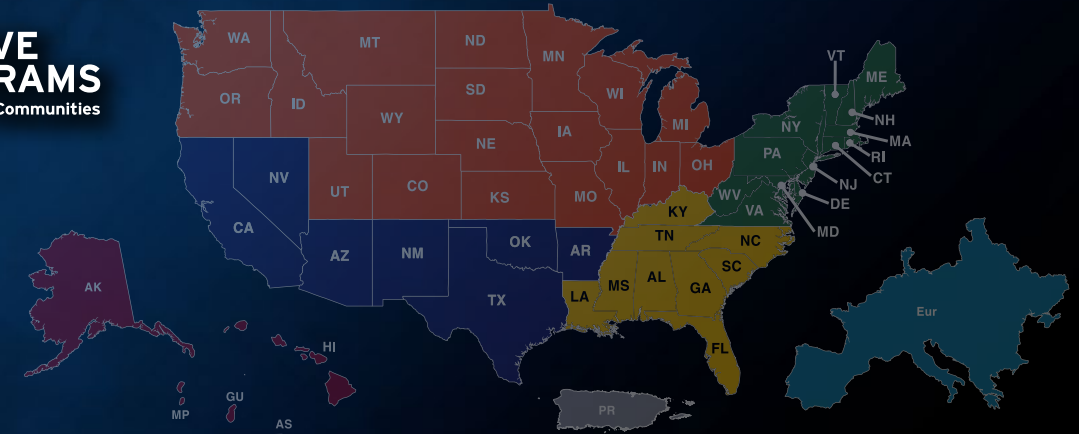
CONCLUSION
