FAFSA and Residency

FAFSA

(Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

- https://www.studentaid.gov
- File as early as October 1 for the following academic year. Financial aid is often given out first-come first serve basis.
- Many early decision college applications and merit scholarships require a FAFSA to submit.
- Deadlines:
 - College Deadlines: Deadlines vary by school.
 - State Deadlines: If applying for aid from your state. https://studentaid.gov/apply-for-aid/fafsa/fafsa-deadlines#state
 - Federal Deadline: June 30 is the last day you can apply for federal aid for the following acad. year.

In-State Tuition Rules

Higher Education Opportunity Act

- Service member must be on active duty for a period of more than 30 days.
- Domicile or permanent duty station is in the state of the school to which the student is applying.
- The state shall NOT charge the member, spouse, or dependent child tuition for attendance at a public institution of higher education in the state at a rate that is greater than the rate charged for residents of the state.







Application Preparation

Create an academic resume for applications and recommenders.

- Academic Summary (GPA, Class Rank, Dual Enrollment, AP Courses, Honors Courses, Special Programs, etc.)
- Honors and Awards (National Honor Society, Certifications, Boy/Girls Scouts, Other Achievements)
- Specific Programs / Things That Stand Out: Out of school sports, arts, scouts, etc.
- School Activities: Clubs, Interscholastic Sports, Academic Programs
- Community Service, Community Engagement, Volunteering
- Employment





College Application Deadlines

Early Action/Early Decision

- Early Action Plans are NON-Binding:
 Students receive an early response to their application, but do not have to commit until the reply date of May 1.
- Early Decision Plans are BINDING: A student who is accepted as Early Decision MUST attend the college.
- October/November deadline timeframe.
- Pros: Can hold on to offer and apply to other schools. High chance of getting accepted and compare financial aid.
- Cons: Few disadvantages to applying early. Not all schools offer early action.

Regular Decision

- January/February deadline time.
- Pros: More time to prepare, take and retake exams. Can apply to as many as you want.
- Cons: Potentially applying to schools with MANY other highly qualified students.
 Won't know until March or April about acceptance. Possibly more stress.

Rolling Admission

Some schools have an open application window until all spots are filled. Opens Oct/Nov timeframe.







Scholarships

- Merit Scholarships: Awarded to high-achieving students.
- Scholarship search sites (filter by locality too if possible)
- Libraries and bookstores
- University scholarship pages
- Your high school (and other local high schools)
- Your community/state (local Greek chapters, local organizations, city and state government, local businesses, dentist and doctor offices, local law firms)
- Local military unit and spouse associations
- Also search by interests, hobbies, heritage, family, occupation, etc.





Post-911 GI Bill (Chapter 33)

WHAT BENEFITS CAN I GET?

- Tuition and fees: If you qualify for the maximum benefit, VA will cover the full cost of public, in-state tuition and fees.
- Money for housing: VA will base your monthly housing allowance on the cost of living where the school is located.
- Money for books and supplies

ELIGIBILITY

- You're a dependent child using benefits transferred by a qualifying Veteran or service member:
 - Served at least 90 days on active duty on or after September 11, 2001
 - Received a Purple Heart on or after September 11, 2001 and honorably discharged.
 - Served at least 30 continuous days on or after September 11, 2001 and honorably discharged with a serviceconnected disability.

WHAT IF I QUALIFY FOR OTHER VA EDUCATION BENEFITS? If you're a member of the National Guard or Reserve using the Montgomery GI Bill Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR or Chapter 1606) and you decide to use the Post-9/11 GI Bill, you can't switch at some later date to use a different VA Education benefit.

Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance (Chapter 35)

WHAT BENEFITS CAN I GET?

- College or graduate degree programs
- Career-training certificate courses
- Educational and career counseling
- **Apprenticeships**
- On-the-job training

ELIGIBILITY

- Must be between the ages of 18 and 26. You may be married or unmarried.
- Parent/Guardian that's a Veteran/Service Member must meet ONE of these qualifications: Permanently and totally disable due to a service-connected disability. Died while on active duty as a result of a service-connected disability. Missing in action or was captured in the line of duty by a hostile force. Forcibly detained or interned in the line of duty by a foreign entity. In the hospital or getting outpatient treatment for a service-connected permanent and total disability and I likely to be discharged for that disability.
- Parent will have to release right to student for educational benefits.
- Student will need a letter from the school showing they are currently enrolled.

Educational and Career Counseling (VA Chapter 36)

WHAT BENEFITS CAN I GET?

- Career counseling to help you decide which civilian or military jobs you want.
- Education counseling to help you find a training program or field of study.
- Academic and adjustment counseling to help you address issues or barriers that get in the way of your success.
- Resume support and goal planning.

ELIGIBILITY

- You're a service member, Veteran, or dependent currently eligible for VA educational benefits.
 - Service member will be discharged under condition other than dishonorable from active duty within 6 months.
 - Service member will be separated from active duty under conditions other than dishonorable not more than 1 year ago.
 - You qualify as a Veteran or service member for educational assistance under a VA educational program.

Montgomery GI Bill Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR) (Chapter 1606)

WHAT BENEFITS CAN I GET?

• Up to \$407 per month in compensation for up to 36 months.

ELIGIBILITY

One of these must be true:

- You have a 6-year service obligation in the Selected Reserve OR
- You're an officer in the Selected Reserve and you agreed to serve 6 years in addition to your initial service obligation.

All of these must also be true.

- You complete your initial active duty for training (IADT) AND
- You get a high school diploma or certificate of equal value, like a High School Equivalency Diploma or GED, before finishing IADT AND
- You stay in good standing while serving in an active Selected Reserve unit.
