We offer relevant and responsive programs, services, and resources based at the local command and within communities to assist command teams in meeting unit readiness and resiliency goals. Our resources at major commands provide a direct and personal interaction with Soldiers and Families for Army Reserve Family Programs.



Army Reserve unit-level command teams establish Soldier and Family Readiness Groups (SFRG) at their units to assist with Family Readiness-related activities, programs and services. ARFP supports the command teams and SFRGs with Regional Family **Program Directors and Family Programs** Coordinators at the Army Reserve Major Subordinate Commands. The Family Programs Directors, Family Programs **Coordinators and Family Readiness** Support Assistants provide a personal touch and local access to ARFP's programs, services and resources. They are also command team resources to assist in unit volunteer opportunities, outreach, information, and activities.

Regional Family Program Directors

Direct Family Programs for Major Subordinate Commands with operations throughout a large, multi-state geographic area.

Family Programs Coordinators

Plan, develop and implement community social service programs and provide staff assistance to solve programs affecting the military community

Family Readiness Support Assistants (FRSA)

Perform clerical and administrative duties supporting Commanders and volunteer SFRG leaders.

Soldier and Family Readiness Groups (SFRG)

SFRGs are established by a commander with volunteers concerned with increasing the unit, Solider and Family readiness and resiliency, especially during periods of military separation.

Army Reserve Volunteer Program

Volunteers have tremendous impact on the health and well-being of the Army Reserve Community, directly affecting the readiness and resiliency of the Command. The Army Reserve Volunteer Program promotes and strengthens volunteerism by uniting community volunteer efforts, enhancing volunteer mobility, and establishing volunteer partnerships.

Numerous volunteer opportunities are available to Soldiers, Families and community members to perform activities supporting the local community and the Army Reserve. These efforts significantly raise awareness of the role of the United States Armed Forces and enhance the quality of life in their communities.

Army Family Action Plan (AFAP)
