Training





WEAPON QUALIFICATION M17

The NCO Academy successfully completed its annual Individual Weapons Qualification (IWQ) with the M17 pistol on April 24, achieving a 100% qualification rate.

Preparation began on April 16 and 17 with preliminary training at the EST 2000. During these sessions, staff and cadre conducted a live-fire simulation to sharpen their skills. SSG Blake Hale led a hands-on familiarization and refresher, ensuring all participants were confident and prepared.

On April 24, the team moved to the range for the official qualification. The event was marked by full engagement, strong morale, and strict safety throughout. The training concluded with no incidents and maximum results.

It was a highly successful day of professional development, teamwork, and marksmanship proficiency.





MAP READING LAND NAVIGATION

On April 28, 2025, the NCO Academy conducted a comprehensive land navigation refresher designed to reinforce essential soldiering skills. The training began with a classroom-based map reading session that covered key fundamentals such as plotting grid coordinates, interpreting terrain features, calculating distances, and using a compass. These core competencies are vital for both individual proficiency and collective success in field operations.

Following the academic portion, participants transitioned to a practical field exercise conducted under steady rain. The weather added a realistic challenge, requiring soldiers to apply their skills in adverse conditions and demonstrating the importance of adaptability and focus in real-world environments.

The training culminated on April 29 with both day and night land navigation evaluations. Armed with only a map, compass, and protractor, soldiers were tasked with accurately locating points across diverse terrain. The night iteration in particular tested their ability to operate with limited visibility while maintaining precision and situational awareness.

Despite the environmental challenges, the training successfully enhanced confidence and competence in land navigation—solidifying its role as a critical skillset for mission readiness.





Achievements, Reenlistments, Promotions



From April 4–14, SSG Taylor S. Pyc, BLC small group leader, competed in the Army's Best Squad Competition — a demanding event that tests physical fitness, tactical skill, and team cohesion.

SSG Pyc excelled in multiple individual events, including land navigation, medical and assault lanes, shoot houses, swim events, and a 12-mile ruck with 70 pounds — finishing in under three hours, a feat achieved by only two soldiers.



His exceptional performance earned him the title of NCO Runner-Up of the Year for the 80th Training Command. He now prepares to compete at the U.S. Army Reserve Command level.

The event underscores the Army's "This is My Squad" initiative, focused on building trust, discipline, and unity within the force.
